- 2. Love your neighbor.

Examples of Behavioral Expectations

- Treat teachers and fellow students with Christian love and respect (John 13:34-35).
- Be prepared for class to begin (includes having books, pencils, pens, notebooks, and other supplies out).
- Follow assignment directions carefully and hand them in at the beginning of the day on which they are due.
- Listen to instruction, take notes, participate in discussion, and keep up to date assignment sheets.
- During class instruction students must:
 - Listen carefully.
 - Takes notes.
 - Participate in class discussions.
 - Follow directions.
- Outside direct instruction students may:
 - \circ Quietly work on uncompleted assignments.
 - Hand in completed assignments.
 - Sharpen pencils.
 - Get supplies from their cubbies.
 - Ask me for permission anything else needed.

Guidance from God's Word

Matthew 22:36-39, "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?" Jesus said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.'

II Peter 3:18, "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory both now and forever. Amen."

Colossians 3:17, "And whatever you do, whether in word or in deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him."

John 13:34-25, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another."

Discipline Consequences

Sinners. Saved

The goal of this policy is the growth of each student, spiritually (II Peter 3:18) and academically. To aid in this growth, consequences are in place when behavior contrary to that growth is present. Consequences may include a note home, loss of recess time, or loss of other privileges.

Examples of events which may lead to consequences:

- An assignment sheet which is not up to date
- Unexcused absence or tardiness
- An assignment below 50%
- Misbehavior
- Not being prepared for class
- Not returning a note home on time
- An assignment in which directions were not followed
- Incomplete work
- Missing work
